Course of fire

The competition consists of three practices at a distance of 100M and will be shot prone supported, prone unsupported, sitting, kneeling and standing.

The supported practice (P1) may use bipods, sandbags or similar permitting free recoil of the rifle. Rear rests are not permitted. Slings (single point, service etc.) may be used in all stages.

40 rounds are required to complete the course of fire plus rounds for sighters.

Max score possible 300 (20X).

Targets: Club Target, PL8 & Fig 11

Sighters: 100M, unlimited rounds; prone (supported or unsupported)

5 min unlimited sighters from prone (supported or unsupported)

Practice 1 : 100M, 10 rounds; prone supported with front bipod or bag (no rear support)

10 shots in 5 min at club target (all time to include reloading)

Max Score 100 (10X)

Practice 2: 100M, 10 rounds; prone unsupported (sling may be used)

10 shots in 5 min at PL8 (all time to include reloading)

Max Score 100 (10X)

Practice 3: 100M, 20 rounds; kneeling and sitting (sling may be used)

Start in the standing alert position with maximum of 5 rounds loaded but NOT made ready.

On whistle adopt prone position, make ready and fire 5 rounds prone, 5 rounds sitting, 5 rounds kneeling, 5 rounds standing at Fig 11 target in 2min 30 s, all time to include reloading.

When changing position safety catch must be applied (safety catch function will be verified prior to commencement), all reloading to be conducted within the specified time frame. A sling may be used

Notes:

1. Targets will be scored after each practice
2. Slings are allowed.
3. Any sights may be used but lasers or any sight that projects an image to the target are not allowed.
4. All members are welcome to take part. Probationary members may shoot under supervision.
5. Scoring : Inward scoring. A shot hole, the lead edge of which comes in contact with the outside of the bullseye or scoring rings of a target is given the higher value. A scoring overlay gauge will be used to determine the value of close shots. The higher value will be allowed in those cases where the flange on the gauge touches the scoring ring.
6. In case of keyhole or tipped shots the higher value is awarded if the lead edge of the bullet hole touches the scoring ring of higher value even though the hole is elongated to the bullet's length rather than being a circle of the bullet's diameter.
7. Visible hits and close groups. As a general rule only those hits which are visible will be scored. An exception will be made in the case where the groupings of **3 or more shots** are so close that it is possible for a shot or shots to have gone through the enlarged hole without leaving a mark and there has been no evidence that a shot or shots have gone elsewhere than through the assigned target. In such a case, the shooter will be given the benefit of the doubt and scored hits for the non-visible shots, on the assumption they passed through the enlarged hole. If such assumption should place a non-visible hit in either of 2 scoring rings, it shall be scored in the higher-valued ring.
